COMMITTED TO INCREASING OUR SOCIAL IMPACT

Sustainable development is a distinctive feature of Université Laval's culture. Prioritizing a participatory approach by, for, and with the community, UL emphasizes the achievement of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals in its activities.

The Sustainable Development Strategy both supports and contributes to Université Laval's 2023–2028 action plan. It is audacious, coherent, and all-encompassing. It helps define a common meaning to maximize the impact of SD actions.

The Strategy builds on the strengths of the university community by linking 21 sectoral plans and strategies. In all, 27 units and more than 100 people took part in the deliberations for setting targets and objectives, as well as the selection of the most contributory commitments. This inclusive approach fosters coherence and synergy between the actions, as well as emphasizing the importance of a holistic perspective. It establishes shared priorities to achieve common goals, thereby growing and amplifying the benefits for society.

The Strategy sets ambitious targets for 2030. It is divided into 3 parts, 7 priorities, and 35 commitments. An initial implementation timeline for 2023–2026 sets out the proposed commitments to meet the identified priorities. Each commitment, in turn, is built on numerous actions that will be gradually taken by multidisciplinary teams. The Strategy also clarifies the roles and responsibilities of the players involved in sustainable development governance, as well as the participatory framework for members of the university community—an essential tool for their mobilization and engagement.

In addition to the Strategy's commitments, the university community will be invited to take part in a collective project to accelerate our response to the climate emergency.

Université Laval would like to thank all the people and units involved for their essential contribution to the development of the Strategy. It is an invitation to transform the way we do things, and to accelerate the integration and deployment of SD within our institution. It is also an invitation to the entire university community to help us build a sustainable future together.

MULTIPLYING OUR OPPORTUNITIES FOR TRANSFORMATION

Université Laval's vision of sustainable development is built around three interdependent and mutually reinforcing parts. This interdependence aims to integrate and accelerate sustainable development at Université Laval by strengthening its teaching and research mission, experimenting with sustainable approaches and behaviours on campus, and participating in the sustainable development of communities.

BACKGROUND

A CULTURE OF SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT AT UNIVERSITÉ LAVAL

Sustainable development is one of Université Laval's defining features. It lies at the heart of its mission:



Driven by a deep-seated culture of sustainable development, Université Laval educates students to be engaged and creative and become model citizens, scientists, and business leaders who have an important impact on the direction that society takes. As a leading French-language institution with a strong international focus, Université Laval strives for excellence in education and research. It seeks to be both an example and a source of inspiration for its partners by mustering the forces of change in Quebec City's thriving university community.”¹

Prioritizing a participatory approach by, for, and with the community, Université Laval emphasizes the achievement of the United Nations (UN) Sustainable Development Goals² (hereinafter the SDGs) in its activities. The sustainable development initiative strengthens Université Laval's contributions, particularly in the fight against climate change, by working with everyone to implement sustainable solutions.

The role of culture

Culture means promoting the arts, science, and heritage (human, scientific, cultural, historical, natural, and built) in a way that enhances cultural diversity and peaceful coexistence on campus, and showcases the expertise of members of the university community.³

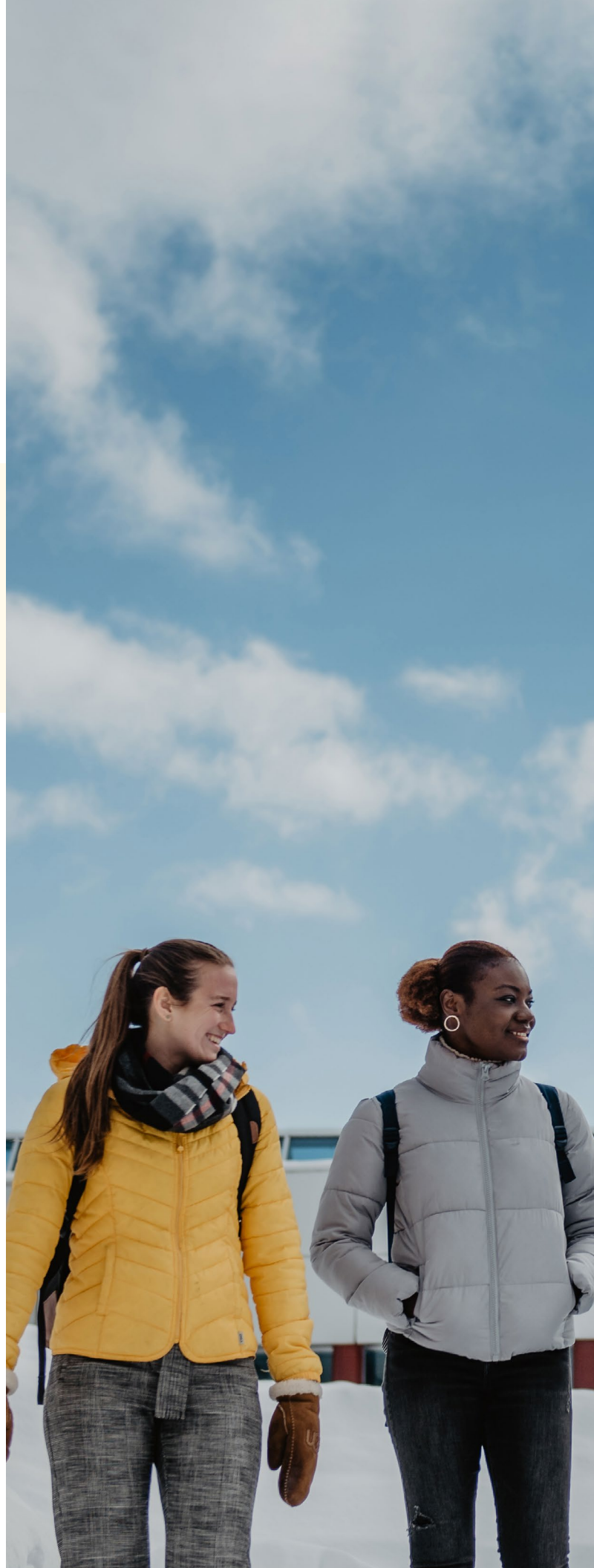
As a living laboratory, the Université Laval library is an important vehicle for culture.

COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Sustainable development (SD) has occupied a central place at Université Laval since the initiative was created in 2007. Université Laval has since chosen to remain heavily involved in global efforts in this area. As such, it subscribes to the 17 SDGs adopted by the United Nations. The SDGs are a “call for action by all countries—poor, rich, and middle-income—to promote prosperity while protecting the planet.”⁴

In recent years, this commitment has been renewed and extended to integrate SD principles and contribute to achieving the SDGs in our practices. At Université Laval:

- > Teaching, research, creativity, and innovation activities are the main contributors to the achievement of the SDGs.

- > Community participation and mobilization are a central pillar of the shared SD culture.



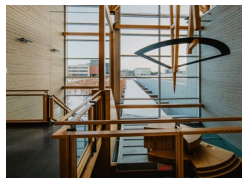

DEFINING SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT AT UNIVERSITÉ LAVAL

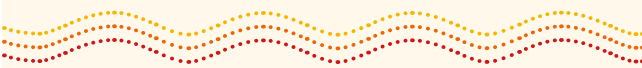
Université Laval is guided in its strategy by the definition of sustainable development set out in its SD Policy, adopted in 2022: “According to the UN definition,⁵ sustainable development is development that meets the needs of the current population without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their needs. Sustainable development calls for joint action to build a sustainable and resilient world, for people and the planet, where everyone has a place.”⁶

During consultations with the university community, notably those carried out during the 2023–2028 planning process, it was brought up that the term “sustainable development” could be updated to better reflect the social and environmental concerns at stake.

As places where knowledge is built and shared, universities are at the heart of its advancement and its underlying concepts. The participatory approach that drives this Strategy provides the audacity, transparency, and coherence needed for the definition of SD to evolve for and with the members of the university community, in order to maximize their mobilization.

Moreover, using the SDGs to guide our actions reinforces the notion of contributing to the fundamental development of people and humanity, both by taking social and economic issues into account and by respecting environmental limits.

The commitments we have made and the actions we will be taking as part of this Strategy attest to an orientation that advocates the deployment of careful, responsible initiatives to support the necessary environmental and social transition, the fight against climate change, and the development of the human skills that will be an essential contribution.



Guardians of the land

In the languages of the First Peoples, the term “sustainable development” does not exist. Guardians of the land for generations, the First Peoples believe that the notion of development is intrinsically sustainable.

ORIENTATIONS

The Sustainable Development Strategy is bold, coherent, comprehensive, and integrated with Université Laval's 2023–2028 strategic plan. It ensures the deployment of the [Shared Vision of Sustainable Development](#), while specifying the commitments under the [Sustainable Development Policy](#). A steering committee was set up to oversee the work leading up to the Strategy's development. Its composition and operation are described in Appendix I.

The Strategy helps define a common direction to maximize the impact of SD actions. It relies on the alignment of Université Laval's 21 sector plans and strategies, which are presented in Appendix II. This approach encourages coherence and synergy between the different actions, thereby growing and amplifying their benefits for society.

As we look toward 2030, Université Laval is proposing to its community that we go further, together. By setting priorities, the Strategy plays a leading role in achieving common goals. It proposes an initial implementation chart covering the 2023–2026 period, which groups 35 commitments made by several units into 7 priorities. A second chart for the 2026–2029 period will follow.

Finally, the Strategy recommends a robust and participatory governance approach that will help the university community realize its collective SD ambitions.

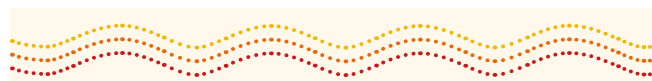
A COLLECTIVE, INCLUSIVE, AND PARTICIPATORY DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

In keeping with the principles of participation and consultation that drive the SD initiative, the Strategy follows an inclusive and collective approach.

Following meetings with those responsible for the 21 action plans and sectors that could potentially contribute to the Strategy, several working meetings were held to clarify certain elements, explore new angles, and guide the selection and drafting of priorities.

In all, 103 people from 27 units took part in the deliberations for setting targets, as well as the selection of the most contributory actions. The working sessions emphasized the importance of collaboration and a holistic approach in building a sustainable future. In addition, numerous SD proposals and concerns were raised during consultations for the 2023–2028 planning process. They have been taken into account in the Strategy's proposals.

- > Component 3 – University and Society encourages communities to get involved in SD.

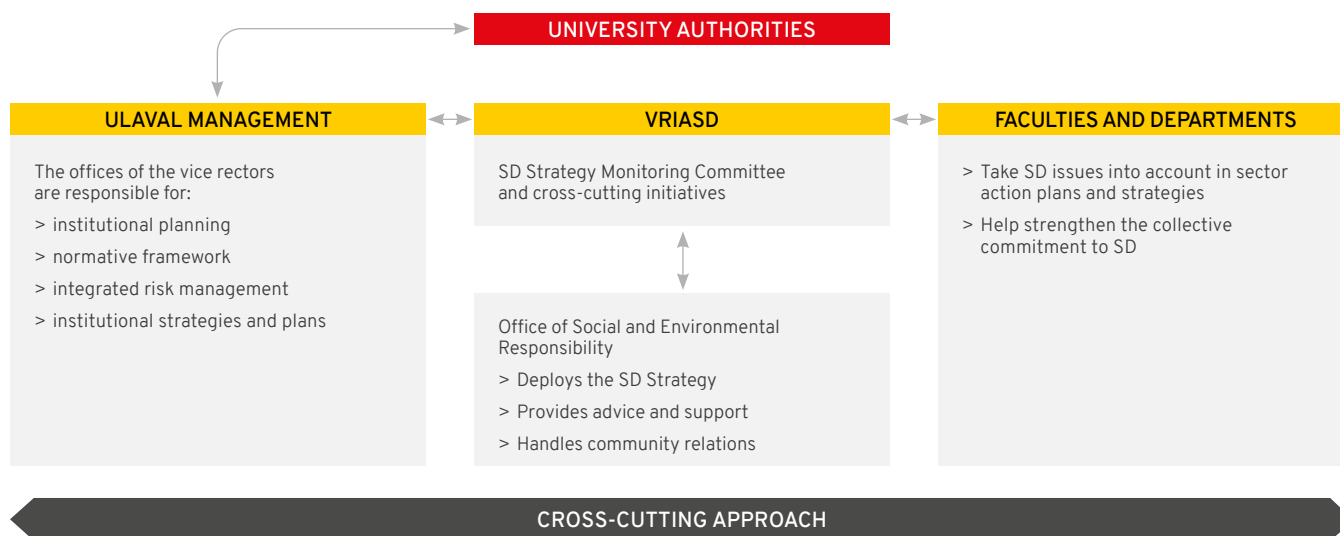
SD GOVERNANCE

RENEWED AND COMMITTED UNIVERSITY GOVERNANCE

Sustainable development is deeply rooted in Université Laval's raison d'être, which is to acquire and share knowledge for the betterment of communities.

To take us further together and support the deployment and monitoring of the Strategy, Université Laval is proposing a renewed governance structure that is committed to sustainable development. Among others, this structure is built around:

- > The strong sustainability culture in its community
- > The university mission, which was updated in 2017
- > The shared vision of sustainable development, which was adopted in 2021
- > The revised Sustainable Development Policy, which was revised and ratified in 2022
- > The 2023–2028 institutional plan (Agir ensemble pour plus d'impact)
- > This Strategy, which will embody our determination to help build a sustainable future together



PARTICIPATORY FRAMEWORK

The participatory SD framework consists of cross-cutting development initiatives. Each initiative coordinates and runs an issue table and working groups to mobilize and involve the university community.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES UNDER THE STRATEGY

The success of the Strategy requires everyone to take action. To that end, Université Laval's main governance bodies share different roles and responsibilities.

UNIVERSITY AUTHORITIES (BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND UNIVERSITY COUNCIL)

- > Adopt the Strategy
- > Ensure that the Strategy's objectives and commitments align with Université Laval's orientations
- > Periodically monitor overall progress and the extent to which targets are being met

UNIVERSITY MANAGEMENT

- > Oversees the application and coherence of the Strategy within Université Laval, respecting the responsibilities of each member of management
- > Ensures that the commitments proposed under the strategy are ambitious and take SD to the next level

FACULTIES AND DEPARTMENTS

- > Consider SD issues in their action plans and strategies
- > Help strengthen collective mobilization toward SD
- > Use their distinct perspectives to set objectives and deploy actions that contribute to the Strategy

OFFICE OF THE VICE RECTOR, INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT (VRIASD)

- > Oversees the steering and relevance of the Strategy, as well as its overall deployment and its ongoing alignment with current and emerging challenges and opportunities
- > Facilitates liaisons, consultations, and collaborations with the faculties and units needed to deploy the Strategy
- > Spearheads interaction between cross-cutting initiatives to unite forces and amplify the achievement of the SDGs and the benefits for society
- > Submits an annual report to governing bodies and the university community

STRATEGY MONITORING COMMITTEE AND CROSS- CUTTING DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES

- > Advise VRIASD on the deployment of the Strategy, the achievement of its targets, and the mobilizing approaches required
- > Support VRIASD in monitoring compliance with the Strategy's orientations during its implementation within Université Laval
- > Lead and deploy a participatory framework (issue tables and working groups as required) to mobilize the university community around the SDGs
- > Propose specific objectives or measures that contribute to SD

OFFICE OF SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSIBILITY

- > Plans and coordinates the deployment of the Strategy
 - > Implements monitoring and continuous improvement mechanisms (such as international certifications and rankings)
 - > Offers consulting services to faculties and units to help them integrate SD into their activities
 - > Deploys the participatory approach, as well as SD mobilization and communication approaches
 - > Handles community relations and related partnerships
 - > Operationalizes certain aspects of the Strategy

THE KEY ROLE OF FACULTIES AND RESEARCH UNITS

Université Laval's faculties, departments, schools, and research units, which bring together the teaching, research, and student communities, act as catalysts for the Strategy's Teaching and Research component. They are directly involved in its implementation, notably through their contribution to the advancement and dissemination of knowledge, as well as to SD education.

GOVERNANCE SUPPORT TOOLS

Université Laval also plans to equip itself with governance support tools that will be rolled out in 2023–2024. They include:

- > The procedure for developing and revising Université Laval's normative documents, which stipulates that they must consider the orientations of the SD Policy
- > Integrated risk management mechanisms, which take the assessment and mitigation of SD-related risks into account
- > Analysis mechanisms and tools to help institutional project managers assess the social and environmental impact and social acceptability of projects in which Université Laval wishes to become involved

Social acceptability

Social acceptability is the result of a collective judgment or opinion about a project, plan, or partnership expressed by the stakeholders concerned. This judgment can be positive or negative, but it is never static. It may involve multiple different levels—from the university community to the entire region and beyond.

CROSS-CUTTING INITIATIVES AS A PARTICIPATORY SD FRAMEWORK

Through its mobilization and commitment, the university community plays a fundamental role in the deployment of sustainable development by proposing bold, concrete solutions to the major challenges facing society.

To accelerate and increase this participation, cross-cutting development initiatives have been introduced for sustainable development, social commitment, responsible entrepreneurship, and sustainable health (see Appendix III). Each initiative consists of an interconnected, intersectoral thematic network. Together, the initiatives amplify the impact of Université Laval's efforts to achieve the SDGs, mobilizing more than 240 people and ensuring synergy in over 50 active partnerships.

These initiatives form the participatory framework for SD while enhancing the ability to seize opportunities arising from the community. This framework is a facilitator for implementing faculty-initiated projects, as it streamlines and synergizes the resources required to carry them out.

Each initiative is co-directed by a scientific and administrative director, and has an issue table and specific working groups made up of representatives of the university community.

More specifically, the Strategy looks to use the cross-cutting initiatives to:

- > Call on units and stakeholders to collaborate as a cross-cutting and
- > multidisciplinary network
- > Maximize the impact of their actions while respecting their autonomy
- > Respond to the need for coherence and interconnection
- > Carry out a prioritization exercise to identify key elements
- > Play a leadership role by inspiring and rallying the different strengths of the university community and its partners toward common goals



OPEN, INCLUSIVE, AND DIVERSE GOVERNANCE

Sustainable development governance at Université Laval aims to be open, inclusive, and diverse. To achieve this, a participatory framework is being deployed. It includes issue tables on the cross-cutting initiatives, various working groups, and advisory committees associated with the different areas of activity (such as responsible food, climate action, responsible investment, energy, and waste management). These values of openness and inclusion underlie the development of this Strategy (see Appendix I).

Strongly guided by an inclusive development orientation (“by, for, and with the community”), the Strategy deployment team will work closely with the EDI team to ensure that the principles of open, inclusive, and diverse governance are appropriately applied, not only to representatives, but also to modes of operation.

Student table on environmental and social issues

Led by the Confédération des associations d'étudiants et étudiantes de l'Université Laval, the Student table on environmental and social issues fosters opportunities for collaboration and dialogue between Université Laval administration and the student body concerning sustainable development expectations, demands, and achievements on campus.
